### President's Letter: September 2019 My First IPMS/USA Nationals

Fellow modeler Len Pilhofer, my wife Fang and I loaded a rented mini-van and headed to Chattanooga, TN at 4pm Monday, Aug. 5<sup>th</sup>. We stopped for the night at the Texas-Louisiana border, continued our journey he next morning and arrived in Chattanooga the evening of Aug. 6<sup>th</sup>. The primary purpose of me attending the 2019 NATS was to meet with vendors and begin selling tables for our 2020 NATS in San Marcos. Len and I had a boat load of NATS 2020 materials to hand out. We knew our time in Chattanooga would be consumed gleaning processes and promoting NATS 2020. But at the last minute we convinced each other that we might as well each take a model to enter. So with the NATS 2020 paraphernalia, models and luggage, we needed a mini-van. We also needed room on our return for any acquisitions made in the vendor hall.

On Wednesday morning we picked up our conference registration materials and setup our NATS 2020 information table. We did not setup for vendor tables



sales, as that would begin on Thursday morning. Initially there were long lines at registration and preregistration. But after we settled in at our information table, the line for pre-registration was gone. So I sauntered over, picked up my registration materials and was done in literally less than 2 minutes. Dick Montgomery was a registration volunteer and I am sure he learned a lot that can only help out with NATS 2020.

My first moment of shock and awe was upon entering the vendor's hall. Holy cow; my credit card would be taking a large hit before leaving Chattanooga. We held off selling 2020 vendor tables until Thursday so I could greet all the vendors and explain the process for buying tables for next year. Upon seeing the vendor hall, Len and I decided to divide it in two. I visited each vendor on my half, handed out the Vendor Table Request Form and my NATS 2020 business card. I explained the process for buying tables and asked a few questions of each vendor. It must have taken an hour to meet all the vendors on my half of the floor. Did I scout out future purchases? Of course I did. The vendor hall was awesome; lots of new things, lots of old kits and lots of good deals. I actually bought nothing on Wednesday, I was too busy promoting NATS 2020 and manning our information table.

On Thursday at 10am we opened up vendor tables sales for 2020. I was warned by our NATS 2020 committee (Team Texas) that I would be swapped. I was also warned by the Chattanooga crew that it was going to be a zoo. In fact Chattanooga had reserved a side room in the vendor hall. They warned that the vendors would be fighting amongst themselves for the 'best' locations. I immediately and without hesitation declined the room and stuck to our plan to sell tables at our information table. If the vendors were going to




fight, I wanted them to do it in full view of their customers. At 10am there were 3 vendors waiting in line. Usually I was sitting idle and occasionally there a line formed of 2 or 3.

On Thursday afternoon I took a break and visited the vendor hall again, this time with money in my pocket to burn. I knew were to head because of my scouting the vendors the day before. I bought a few old kits I had seen. I bought a few modeling tools that looked interesting. My biggest purchases were aftermarket detail sets for my 1/96<sup>th</sup> and 1/144<sup>th</sup> Saturn Apollo kits, a Zoukie-Mura 1/48<sup>th</sup> F-4J and a Polar Lights 1/350<sup>th</sup> TOS Enterprise.

On Friday morning I found time to enter the 2 models I brought for competition; more shock and awe. There were more than 5000 models, 3100 entered for competition. While some of the builds were 'average' quality, most were some amazing. Not only in craftsmanship, which I expected, but also incredibly imaginative and creative. The winner of the theme award was diorama of a 1950's family seeing the man of the house of to work. The mother was adjusting the husband's work uniform; the son was holding his father's briefcase and the family dog was nearby. What was imagi-





native and creative about the diorama? The man of the house was a Storm Trouper and the wife was helping with his breast plate.

On Saturday night I attended the awards ceremony where our own Rob Booth was awarded the inaugural Modeler of the Year award. A honor well earned.

We decided to drive back to San Antonio in a single day. Promptly at 7:30am Sunday, fully loaded, we pulled away from the hotel. We pulled into Len's driveway a little after 9pm that evening. My experience at my first NATS was terrific. There were many seminars I wish I could have attended had I not been so busy selling 2020 vendor tables. I definitely recommend attend at least one Nats in your modeling lifetime.



# Tamiya 1/48 Scale Lockheed P-38 F/G Lightning

robably one of the most anticipated releases of 2019 is the upcoming Tamiya version of the venerable Lockheed P-38 Lightning in 1/48 scale. Still to be released a few Alamo Squadron members—including myself—were able to get our hands on one at the IPMS/USA National Convention last month in Chattanooga, Tennessee. Tamiya USA had a handful of pre-production versions that were raffled off to convention ticket holders. If your ticket number was drawn, you had the option of purchasing one for \$50. Maybe not a true raffle "win", it is cheaper than the list price upon release which will be approximately \$80. So, if 1/48 WWII aircraft are your thing, \$50 for a new Tamiya kit is still a bargain.

- P-38F and P-38G variants can be built.
- The model creates a parked aircraft when assembled and complete.
- Features accurate depictions of early P-38 features such as slimline engine cowlings, intercoolers in leading edges, plus the curved canopy front.
- Weights are included in the kit to ensure correct balance of the model when displayed.
- The canopy can be assembled open or closed. When closed, it is a 1-part slide-molded piece with dedicated F and G variant parts. The hatch is shown open sideways on the P-38F, and vertically on the P-38G.
- A detailed cockpit features the wheel-type controls, radio, throttle box and more.
- Comes with parts to recreate two each of 150- and 300-gallon drop tanks.
- Includes two marking options: "White 147" P-38G which took part in the interception of Admiral Isoroku Yamamoto in April 1943 and "White 33" P-38F.
- Mirror stickers are included to recreate cockpit mirror and engine cowling interior surface sections.• Comes with canopy masking stickers and a full-color painting guide.





### Unicorn Gundam Odaiba Diorama

s with many things in Japan, giant mechas and giant monsters are very important subjects on their culture. In the late decades on the 20th Century, there was a myriad of giant mechas series on TV that were distributed very fast outside of Japan – I used to watch a series in Mexico in which giant robots lived inside a mountain and fly to fight monsters and whatnot.

Gundam is one of the most successful series of this genre that was released in 1979, in which there is no good VS evil script per se, but humans morals and behaviors take place in a war – each side thinking they are acting for the good of humanity. Gundam (Japanese ガンダム, pronounced "Gundamu") is a contraction of the words "Gun Freedom", so yeah, at first it was called "Gundom", but it was not appealing to the Japanese culture of the 70's, that was getting into the Western culture, including the English language.

In this sense, the futuristic Gundam series – produced by the Japanese company "Sunrise" - depicts all sorts of giant mechas (giant robots or machines (mechs) controlled by pilots inside them), with powerful weapons. The *Gundam RX-78-2* is the first and main character of the Gundam franchise, and there are many versions of it as model kits, all released by Bandai brand.



Bandai released plastic models of airplanes, cars, and toys, since the 60's. But in the 80's it found its golden goose with the Gundam franchise, and 40 years and millions of plastic kits released later (called "Gunpla", as in "Gundam Plastic Models"), it is one of the most successful Japanese brands of scale models, pairing up with other giants like Tamiya and Hasegawa.

#### The Gundam Unicorn

One of this mechas in the Gundam Unicorn, that is piloted by a 17-year-old kid called Banagher Links, who tries to show adults that war is wrong. When he gets inside the Gundam he becomes one with the machine, and all his feelings and thoughts are united with the circuitry in something that is called "Psycho-Frame" – an active crystal frame inside the machine - and the Gundam transforms into the most highly advanced of all the Gundam machines.

Gundam Unicorn is now a series on Netflix. The action sequences go hand in hand with many philosophical ideas of good, kindness, human logic, the reason for war, and the reason that must be peace among nations – yes, the now classic idea that the Japanese culture was affected in its roots by "Big Boy" and "Fat Man". Noticeable is the mind-blowing logic of who's wrong and who's right in episode 6, minute 20, by the characters of Banagher, his archrival Char Aznable and the main female character Audrey Burne. I recommend it, so go ahead and check it out! Hey, it might even your induction to the Anime genre in movies, if you haven't got caught yet.


So, the Japanese went ahead and built a 1:1 scale model of the Unicorn Gundam. The Statue is located in Odaiba, an artificial island in Tokyo Bay, Japan. The 65-foot statue was unveiled on September 24, 2017, standing next to a Tokyo Plaza Mall called DiverCity. The statue opens its plates and shows the Psycho-Frame, that is lighted and fumes come out of its rocket exhaust, while a short of the anime is played in a giant screen behind it on the mall façade.

Adjacent to the statue is the Gundam Café, a place where food and drinks are all Gundam related subject.



#### The Diorama

My diorama depicts the Odaiba plaza in front of the mall, with the Unicorn Gundam showing the Psycho-Frame.



#### PLAZA

I made the main plaza with a photograph frame for the whole diorama, using the back of the frame as a base. I applied texturized paint to simulate gravel and other kinds of flooring. The trees, grass and flowers are from Winmodo. The lighting posts are Evemodel, powered by 2-10-volt batteries in the back of the diorama.







### Unicorn Gundam Odaiba Diorama

#### **GUNDAM FIGURE**

The figure is a **Bandai HG RX-0 Unicorn Gundam in Destroy Mode**, in red Psycho-Frame. I repainted the whole inner frame with metallic paint, and the armor plates with acrylic white.

The idea is to leave it as clean as the actual statue. Nevertheless, a very light shadowing was applied with Tamiya Weathering Master for depth effect, and a spray of clear matte coat. The decals are waterslides from Bandai, instead of the stickers from the original kit.

The figure is placed in the diorama by means of a metal rod in one of its foot that serves as anchor to the base.




#### DIVER CITY FAÇADE

I made the mall façade with a 5mm plastic sheet, and treated with acrylic colors. I created the divisions (squares) with a hobby knife. The clear parts are made of acrylic plastic. I made the lettering with bond paper cut with hobby knife (from my days on paper-scale-modeling). The Gundam Café logo is made with an actual Bandai Gundam V-fin (the "antennas" in the forehead of Gundam mechas, a reminiscence of the Samurai's "kuwagata") and paper. The screen is an Amazon Fire tablet, that when connected to the Internet, I log in to my Netflix account and play the Gundam Unicorn series on it.



The back of the façade, or structure, was made of old iPhone boxes and blocks of polystyrene.

On the left side of the façade there are some logos of the stores inside the mall. I changed the logos of the mall to logos of local modeling stores here in San Antonio, Texas. Of course, I asked proper authorization form the store owners to display their store's logos. Can you recognize them?



### Unicorn Gundam Odaiba Diorama

#### **PEOPLE**

The people figures are Toogoo brand in N scale (1/150), and even when they were already painted, I re-painted them with acrylics to add details (eyes, mouths, cloth details and accessories... and some with eyelashes!). I also needed to sand the rough ends of the figures.



Every Gundam is a space-war-ship, and it is piloted by a human (or in the Gundam lore, a "*Newtype*" human), and has total control of the mecha. When you buy a Gundam kit, you'll find that it comes with the figure

of its pilot, that you can pose beside you completed model. There are 6 figures that are the actual pilots of 6 different Gundam kits, all in 1/144 scale, and that I painted with acrylics. I place them scattered in the diorama as a game for the onlookers of the diorama to find (think of "Where's Waldo?").

#### **CONCLUSION**

I really enjoyed building this diorama of the Odaiba Unicorn Gundam, and I learned a lot. As Gundam models are becoming more and more popular, especially among youngsters (and the young at heart), the Bandai company is not stopping here. At 40 years form its commencement, it looks like the Gundam franchise is just starting to take flight.

Every month there are many new Gundam kits, roughly every 6-9 months there is a new Gundam anime series, merchandise galore, and the first upcoming liveaction movie by Legendary Pictures, and Gundam filling up more and more tables on the IPMS events, maybe you also will get your feet wet on this category of scale modeling... and you are welcome to do it!
