



1997 Ford F-150 Instructions

By Keith Rule

Introduction

Jerry is always needing Navigator articles so I thought why not use the instructions I write for almost every build as part of an article. If this seems to be informative. I will continue to do this in the future. I haven't built a light truck since my Foose 1956 build, I tend to build for contest categories and it was time for another light truck. I chose the AMT '97 Ford F-150 kit. After reviewing the kit, I realized I could build it as a southern boy's, or Billy Bob's truck.


pattern found online, dragged into
Powerpoint and reduced to fit, printed on decal paper, sealed with 2 coats of clear acrylic, cut to fit and applied to the seats

- Installing the two rear fenders, tailgate, and bumper required scratcbuilding support pieces glued to the frame
- Truck bed finished with Rustoleum Black Textured spray can.



Bullet Points

- Aftermarket resin wheels and tires
- Scale 3" lift built into susspension system
- Open hood held in place with pieces of elastic band hidden from view
- Seat insets are a



Billy Bob's Truck (1997 Ford F150) **Instructions**

- 1. Mock-Up body components, check fit to interior, chassis, etc.
- Cut away depressed 2. area of interior floorboard to allow chassis frame to fit.
- Windshield must be in 3. exact position. Scratchbuild support at roof for upper edge of windshield.
- 4. Fender fit to body is questionable. Add .030 strips for positive fit.
- Glue grille unit to front 5. of body.
- Glue inner and outer tailgate pieces.
- Scratchbuild front bumper unit support piece and glue to bottom of front grille.
- Repair front 8. grille/body seam.
- Repair fill panels 9. bottom of interior tub.
- 10. Sand entire body with 400 - 800
- 11. Sand off molded printing at interior roof.
- 12. Repair 4 injection

- points at underside of hood and injection points on roll bar. Remove fire extinguisher and bands 19. Tape off tabs and from roll bar.
- 13. Assemble roll bar.
- 14. Scribe and prep panel lines.
- 15. Airbrush test spoon with MCW Gloss White and Gloss Yellow Enamel.
- 16. Airbrush test part with paint/sand technique for bed liner. Compare paint/sand technique to textured paint.
- 17. Tape off rear of cab and end of bed for future glue.

- 18. Tape off front bumper and scratchbuilt support for future glue.
- frame where cab glues to frame for future glue.
- 20. Tape off front bumper pieces where chrome meets paint.
- 21. Tamiya Gray Primer at cab, hood, front bumper pieces, bed, both fenders, mirrors, tailgate unit, firewall, roll bar, wheels, and frame. Sand as needed.
- 22. Putty, sand, repair as needed.
- 23. Tamiya White Primer per Gray Primer.
- 24. Airbrush inside of hood MCW Gloss Yellow Enamel.



- 25. Mask and airbrush oval and curved areas inside of hood Tamiya Flat Black.
- 26. Airbrush bottom of bed and flat frame areas Tamiya Flat Aluminum. Mask flat aluminum and airbrush sides of bed Tamiya Flat Black. Mask flat areas of frame and airbrush frame Tamiya Semi-Gloss Black
- 27. Airbrush inside of fenders and bottom of interior tub Tamiya Flat Black
- 28. Mask inside piece of tailgate unit.
- 29. Airbrush color coats as follows:
- Layout white/yellow dividing line.
- Mask yellow area and airbrush MCW Gloss White Enamel at cab, front bumper pieces, both fenders, and tailgate unit.
- Pull masking and cure in dehydrator.
- Mask gloss white and airbrush MCW Pearl Yellow Gloss Enamel at cab, hood, both fenders, mirrors, tailgate unit, and firewall.
- Pull masking and cure in dehydrator.
- Layout and airbrush MCW Mediterranean Blue stripe at cab.
- Pull masking and cure in dehydrator.
- Layout and airbrush MCW Pepper Gray stripe at cab, both fenders, tailgate unit. Airbrush MCW Pepper Gray wheels and roll bar.
- Mask and airbrush lights at roll bar Tamiya Flat Black.
- Brush paint silver at taillight lenses and roll bar lenses.
- Apply "Lariat" decals.
- 30. Clean and polish clear window parts with 1000, 2000, 3000, Meguiar's Ultimate Compound with Dremel as needed. Finish with Meguiar's Ultimate Polish with Dremel. Mask and airbrush Tamiya 50/50 Semi-Gloss at windshield perimeter.

- Airbrush Tamiya Semi-Gloss at window perimeter.
- 31. Clear coat cab, hood, front bumper pieces, both fenders, tailgate unit, mirrors, wheels, and roll bar using MCW 2K Enamel Clear Coat mix 2 parts clear to 1 part hardener to 1 part Mr. Hobby Leveling Thinner. Spray 1 Medium Coat. Cure several hours or overnight. Black ink panel lines and windshield vents with .10 Rotring Isograph. Apply decals per notes on instructions. Check for debri and sand out. Spray 1 wet coat. Cure several hours or overnight. Check for debri and sand out. Repeat for 1-5 more coats until happy with gloss. Sand debri to flat with 3000. Polish with Meguiar's Ultimate Compound using Dremel and wool polishing attachment. Polish with Meguiar's Ultimate Polish using Dremel and wool polishing attachment.
- 32. Fabricate step pads for side steps and rear bumper from .020 styrene. Mask finished area of tailgate unit, sides and bottom of bed. Apply paint/sand technique of textured paint to bed, inside of tailgate unit, and step pads.
- 33. Mask and airbrush Tamiya Flat Black at step pads, rear bumper top edge, fender tops, rear window perimeter, and tailgate handle. Airbrush Tamiya Semi-Gloss Clear at same areas.
- 34. Apply Meguiar's Yellow Wax.
- 35. Apply flat black wash to front grille.
- 36. Install step pads.
- 37. Scratchbuild Nerf Bars. Airbrush bar and brackets Tamiya Semi-Gloss Black.
 Airbrush step pad MCW Pepper Gray Enamel. Assemble and pin to frame with staple pins.

Engine & Chassis

- 1. Review kit instructions.
- 2. Prep parts.
- 3. Dechrome engine parts,
- 4. Scratchbuild 3" lift components.
- Mock-up body, fenders, and chassis to check stance of 3" lift. Alter if needed.
- 6. Remove projections on wheel side of rear wheel mount. Test fit wheel and glue aftermarket disc brake to wheel mount.
- 7. Remove projections from steering knuckles and both sides of front disc brakes. 9. Drill holes through center of steering knuckles and disc brakes. Install round rod to front wheels to fit holes in steering knuckles and disc brakes.
- 8. Airbrush all parts Tamiya Gray Primer.
- 9. Airbrush parts per notes on kit instructions.
- Plan any engine detailing after assembly and mockup.
- 11. Assemble per instructions and 3" lift notes.

Interior

- 1. Review kit instructions.
- 2. Make notes on kit

- instructions.
- 3. Mexican blanket experiment.
- 4. Download seat pattern and experiment with print on white decal paper and plain paper. Finish with 2 coats se acrylic spray.
- 5. Airbrush all parts Tamiya Gray Primer.
- 6. Airbrush parts per notes on kit instructions.
- 7. Apply gray flocking to floor.
- 8. Experiment with application of seat decals and seat plain paper prints.
- 9. Airbrush all parts with Tamiya Semi-Gloss.
- 10. Apply dash decals and trim paint.
- 11. Fabricate overhead seat belts.



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
